Code enforcement: I would like to extend a special thanks to Jim Kier who has worked with us to provide Code Enforcement assistance during our transition from working with the Village of Honeoye Falls to the Town of Richmond. We now have an agreement in place and will be sharing Scott and Kayleigh—please welcome them to West Bloomfield when you see them!

The Town Board is always looking for interested residents to serve on our Planning and Zoning Boards—we have room for alternates as well—so please let me know if you are interested or would like to discuss further. The Town Board will begin working on the 2024 budget in the next couple months. If you have anything you would like us to consider we need to hear from you.

Ontario County has been very busy this year—I am serving as the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, first time for a West Bloomfield Supervisor in over 100 years. The BOS has recently been discussing the situation with those seeking Asylum (through the City of New York) and where to house them. We also have been working with the office of County Clerk after the sudden passing of Clerk Hoose, and working on what the future of the County landfill will be. The current landfill contract expires in 2028 and there are many different scenarios to consider that have impacts on all of our residents.

The Highway Department is excited to welcome summer 2023! We are full of optimism for a productive roadwork season. You may have already noticed the oil and stone that was completed on Factory Hollow, Sand, and Elton Roads. Soon the excess stone will be swept off and new lines will be painted.

Our major repair projects for this year are on Allens Hill North and Lefevre South. We will be cleaning ditches, replacing culvert pipes, and finally paving in mid-July. Our other warm weather jobs include mowing roadsides, parks, and the Pioneer Cemetery. We'll also be cleaning ditches, repairing and replacing aging culverts, and installing driveway culverts for new home builds. All of this keeps the highway crew very busy.

We're grateful to **Extreme Tree and Landscape** for the stump-grinding at the Pioneer Cemetery. The company provided this service to the Town at no charge.

At the time of this writing, I am at the 76th Annual School for Highway Superintendents at Ithaca College, where I and hundreds of other superintendents are learning better ways to lead our departments.

We at West Bloomfield Fire Department have been busy helping neighboring departments with wildland and brush fires. We are very happy that our town residents have refrained from burning and have obeyed the burn ban, which ran from March 16th through to May 14th. Now that summer is upon us, flowers are growing, gardens are planted, and everyone is enjoying our beautiful outdoors -- don't forget to check those Co and smoke detectors, test them monthly, and if needed change them or the batteries in them. Practice your family exit drills periodically (hopefully you never need them), but always stay prepared.

Our department has some tables and chairs that we loan out to people who live in our town. A reminder to everyone: If wanting to borrow such items, you must call John MacKenzie (585-739-3582) or email <u>president@westbloomfieldfiredept.org</u> and reserve the items. Since we have been losing tables and chairs in the past years, <u>no items</u> can leave the firehouse without being reserved and put in the reservation book. Myself or another firefighter will sign items out at a prescheduled pickup time and check them back in at another prescheduled return date. The policy is for everyone, firefighters and townspeople included, and every item must be accounted for. If we continue to lose items, the Fire Dept. will be forced to stop lending them out. This is a community service that we do for our townspeople at no charge, but we do accept donations when they are offered and thank you for them.

West Bloomfield Fire Dept. has a Red Cross certified instructor in our membership and we are looking to possibly offer a CPR/Basic first aid class to residents of our town in the future. The class would be limited to 12 people per class and we would try to schedule them on Saturday mornings or possibly on a week night also. There will be Adult CPR/AED, Adult CPR, Adult CPR/AED/Pediatric classes available, and the class costs would range from \$55 through \$95. We are always looking for vehicles to use for training. 

As such our prices were adjusted after the meeting as follows: plots to \$800, casket burial to \$900, and a cremation burial to \$550. In addition, there is now a \$300 surcharge for weekend or holiday interments for casket burials. These changes were approved by the NYS Division of Cemeteries.

REMINDER: When placing flowers and plants on the graves, they must be potted. Any items permanently planted in the ground will be removed as allowed by NYS Cemetery Law. Also, by local policy, memorial lights are NOT allowed at any time in the cemetery.

SERVICES: If you wish to purchase a lot or schedule the installation of a monument, please contact the Superintendent, Larry Evans, at 585-624-4993.

LASTLY: Over time a granite headstone will build up debris on it to the point that the inscription will become difficult to read. There are three ways to clean a headstone. First, hire a professional headstone cleaner to clean it. Second, buy a bottle of headstone cleaner and do it yourself according to the instructions on the bottle. Third, do it yourself with mild household cleaner such as Dawn detergent, water, and a brush with stiff plastic bristles. Do not use a wire brush as it will scratch the headstone. Also, do not use household cleaners such as bleach as they will deteriorate the granite over time. Start out by moistening the stone with water, then apply a small amount of Dawn. Next briskly scrub the stone with the brush. Finish off the process by rinsing the stone with water. Most likely, you will have to repeat this process a couple of times. Below are two pictures of a headstone: one before cleaning and one after cleaning using Dawn and water.
