Tax Reminders & Information

Detailed information on how and where to pay your taxes can be found on your tax bill. Town and County taxes are due in January and are collected at the Town Clerk's Office (9097 Daylight Drive, West Bloomfield, NY). During the month of **January**, Canandaigua National Bank locations will accept **full** payments only. The Statutory deadline for the County to deliver the warrant is December 31st. The Warrant grants the Collecting Officer the authority to collect taxes. Without the Warrant the collecting officer cannot accept taxes.

State Law

According to the Real Property Tax Law §922, the failure to mail a tax bill or the failure of a property owner to receive a tax bill will not affect the validity of the taxes or interest prescribed by law. Also, we are not legally allowed to change or rescind penalties, Real Property Tax Law §924.

Payment Information

Please make sure your check is made out correctly, including pay to, date, and matching written and numerical amounts. Any checks incorrectly made out will be returned and may be subject to a penalty if received by the tax receiver after the penalty free period. We do not accept postdated checks; they will be returned and may be subject to penalties. If payment is made by mail, the United States Postal Service postmark (not a postage meter mark) is used as the payment date (RPTL §925). If there is no postmark, the date received will be used as the payment date.

For your convenience, there is a secure drop box located at the Town Hall. Payments by **check** may be placed in the drop box. The box is checked daily by 9 A.M. on regular Town Clerk business days. Payments collected will be considered received on the prior business day. The Town of West Bloomfield now accepts credit cards for municipal payments, including tax payments. Fees will apply.

General Information

Upon payment of the taxes by the bank or mortgage company, the receipt is mailed directly to the homeowner within two to three weeks.

If you are responsible for paying the property taxes and have not received your town / county tax bill by mid-January, please contact the Tax Office (585-624-2914) immediately.

If you receive a bill in error (ex: you no longer own the property), please notify and return the bill to the Tax Receiver's Office.

Treasures in the Collection: During winter closure we've worked on our local history collection and uncovered some great pieces from West Bloomfield's early families. To name a few . . . a circa 1820 wedding dress . . . 19th century children's clothing . . . and men's garments likely worn by Myron Shelly Hall (born 1820). Mr. Hall's daughter wrote that he was "absolutely neat; always wore white shirts which Mrs. Mack declared needed no washing at the end of a week." Our work was aided by two grants from the NY State Council on the Arts/Greater Hudson Heritage Network. One brought the services of consultant Wilma Townsend who taught us about proper care of textiles, garments, and photographs. A second grant provided acid-free storage for such items. We're eager to share more of the collection with you in 2024. Recent donations include a Native American tool from the Factory Hollow area and a Civil War document handwritten by a West Bloomfield resident.

We need your knowledge: This year we also plan to ask for <u>your</u> help in identifying some of our unlabeled photographs. Watch for announcement of an "old photo day" at WBHS. And thank you for your support!

Highway Superintendent's Update

This morning I'm looking out my office window at the first measurable snow of the season. It's been warmer than usual this fall season and we've only had a few salt runs on icy mornings. Despite the low snow amounts this year, we at the highway Department are not easily fooled by mother nature. We know that January and February are the snowiest and most bitter months of the year, and we remain ready to respond.

All our trucks and plow equipment are in good working order thanks to the hard working and conscientious highway crew. 2024 will see the addition of one new 10-wheel plow truck and a 1-ton plow truck. The 10-wheeler will replace an older one that will go to auction. The one-ton truck is an allpurpose truck that's used by our night crews to patrol, clean and salt intersections and assist in the main plow runs in the early mornings.

Speaking of early mornings, you might wonder how and when we decide to go out and plow the roads. A lot happens here at night while most people are asleep. A typical winter night sees me or one or the other highway employees out between midnight to 3am watching the road conditions, cleaning up intersections, treating icy spots and deciding whether a full plow run is needed. Once the decision is made to plow, the truck drivers are called at 3am, those drivers arrive, do their safety checks, fill trucks with salt and are on the road by 4am. By the time you're on your way to work and the school buses are out, the roads are clean, and our trucks are safely back in the barn. Occasionally there are some hiccups, like a truck breaking down or getting stuck or so much snow that we barely keep up, but most nights it runs very smoothly.

Even when it's not snowing highway crew stays busy with all kinds of projects including snow fence installation, equipment repairs, building maintenance, tree trimming and generally keeping equipment in tip top shape. We are also doing our brainstorming for the spring cleanup and planning our major road repairs for the summer. This includes meeting with salespeople, discussing new products, gathering bids, and building teams with neighboring towns to assist with the work.

Other than "how do we decide when to plow?" Here's a few other questions that I'm asked every winter:

Why do plow trucks go so slow?

Our trucks plow and salt at between 25-30 mph. This is the optimal speed for the salt to be distributed properly and for drivers to react safely. Please remember this when approaching the trucks and give them plenty of room.

Why do the plow trucks fill my driveway with snow?

We have no control over the snow at the end of driveway. When you plow or clean your driveway make sure to pile the snow on the right side so that we don't push your pile back into the driveway. <u>ALSO</u>, please remember that it's illegal to push snow across or into the road. This includes you, someone you hire or from shovels or snow blowers.

Will you replace my mailbox if it's damaged by snowplows?

The Highway Department is under no obligation to replace anything in the right of way, including mailboxes. We do, however, replace a few every year as a courtesy if we are clearly to blame. If your mailbox is hit, we will replace it with a standard metal mailbox. If, however, your mailbox falls over due to the weight of the snow hitting it, we will inspect it to see what caused it. Quite often the post has rotted, or it was poorly installed. Then you'd be informed that it does not qualify for repairs. We always offer a temporary mailbox until you're able to make repairs in the spring.

What do you mix with the salt?

We add a product called Magic which is a blend of magnesium chloride and molasses. This product allows the salt to work at a lower temperature and reduces the bounce of the salt particles as they hit the road. This helps us keep the salt on the road where it belongs. It also works well for pretreating before a snow event. Product specifications sheets are available for anyone interested in my office.

Why are the doors locked at the highway department?

The highway department is a busy place and safety is an upmost priority. There are all kinds of operations going on

including backing up of equipment, welding, loud noises, just to name a few. We don't want innocent visitors injured. At other times the crew and I are out on a job, and no one is in the building. If you plan to visit, please call ahead, or use the office entrance at the south end of the building where the old town hall used to be. Your always welcome!

Well, that's about all from me. The next time I write, it'll be springtime and the birds will be singing! As always, if you have questions, give me a call at 585-624-2900

WEST BLOOMFIELD FIRE DEPARTMENT

About the Fire Siren: We have had some questions about the siren back working and being much louder than it used to be. For a long time, the siren was operating on half of the electric current it should have been operating on. We had the siren removed from the roof by Martin's Electric, Penn Yan, NY, after it completely stopped. They took it to their shop and completely rebuilt it, including rewinding the entire armature and old internal wiring. This siren was purchased in the early 1950s from a building in Buffalo, NY, and brought to West Bloomfield by our own Corky (Alwyn) Rose and other firefighters. It has been on our roof since the current firehouse was built. The siren cycles once at noon, 6 days a week. In earlier years this helped to notify farmers and other workers in the area that it was lunchtime. That tradition continues today.

The fire siren was out of service for months getting repaired. This was a large but needed expense. The fire siren will now go off at noon each day for one cycle as it has in the past. It will cycle through the entire up and down sequence when an emergency call goes into the 9-1-1 center, and they trip the siren and our monitors to alert firefighters of the emergency. The siren will also cycle through the entire sequence on Monday evenings, usually between 1930 and 2000 hours, except on holidays. This is when the 9-1-1 center tests the monitors and sirens of all the fire departments in the county to verify that all emergency alerting systems are working properly. To those questioning the need for the fire siren, feel free to stop at the fire house when you see people there. We will gladly show you that pagers and cell service are not 100% reliable, including inside our firehouse. The fire siren not only alerts firefighters and the public to an emergency, but it also lets the person calling for help know that we are on the way. Lastly, for the few who feel inconvenienced by the sound, please think of all the volunteers who have inconvenienced family, job, and personal life to help their community.

The West Bloomfield Fire Department officers and members would like to thank everyone who has donated to our annual fund drive. Every penny goes to equipment, maintenance of vehicles and the building, and repairs. In the fire service, OSHA sets limits on serviceable equipment. All our firefighting hoses are tested annually, and if they do not pass a pressure test, must be replaced. Per OSHA guidelines, they all need to be replaced after 10 years of service. Our firefighter's protective turnout gear must also be replaced after 10 years of service, or if contaminated from a structure, vehicle, or any type of emergency response situation. These OSHA guidelines are set to protect firefighters and to assure equipment is in tip-top shape for emergency use. All the equipment is very expensive because it must be NFPA (National Fire Protection Agency) approved.

With the colder weather upon us, please make sure all wood stoves, fireplaces and chimneys are properly cleaned and maintained and that all Co and smoke detectors are in proper working condition. We do not want the next siren going off to be for your home. Make sure your car or truck is also set for the cold weather. It's always good to be prepared for the worst.

We are always looking for help, not only for fire and emergency calls, but any type of all-around help. Stop at the fire house any Monday night or when you see activity there and we will welcome you.
