Town Supervisor's Update

Hello, and welcome to Spring! This winter has certainly been an interesting one, with numerous records being set, and looks like more to come as I'm writing this. The unusually warm weather has us looking at getting a jump on Spring. Please stop in at the Town Hall and see the Town Clerk, Brenda, if you need a permit for Boughton Park or have questions about using the fields or pavilion in Michael Prouty Park.

The Town is hoping to start our review and update of our Comprehensive Plan (paused due to COVID).

Please send me an e-mail if you are interested in being on the committee. This is a long-term plan that helps to set the future direction of the Town and covers many different topics from land use to infrastructure, zoning, recreation, housing, historic resources, and other community topics. One area of discussion will also involve the future of the County landfill (currently contracted through 2028) and our own transfer facility. We are in the planning stages of several American Rescue Plan (ARPA) projects—paving of the Town Hall parking lot and an update of the playground in Prouty Park. I believe that both projects will provide some long-term benefits to our residents (Town Hall would then be available for use as a polling site, and the playground will provide a safer alternative for families using the park).

Please take some time to review the Town's website, https://townofwestbloomfield.org. We are always updating it with information about activities in our area in the calendar section, and we also have a posting about the County's hazardous materials/electronics recycling/shredding/tire events.

We are always looking for interested residents to fill positions on our planning, zoning and assessment boards (we have two alternate positions for each board), and on committees that help guide the Town Board and future direction of the town. My door is open when I am here in the Town Hall—please stop in and see me or send me an e-mail if you have interest in serving on a committee or one of our boards.

NYS DEC Update - As of August 1, 2024, DEC is changing from printing sporting licenses and all items sold through DECALS on special license stock (Valeron), to printing on plain paper. This change will allow DEC to become more cost effective, keep up with emerging technologies, and help reduce our carbon footprint. Customers will still be able to purchase their licenses in-person at an issuing agent, online, or over the phone. When purchasing a license in-person, the customer will have the option of having their license, tags, and other items emailed to them rather than printing them at the point of sale. This change is effective for the 2024-25 license year and will begin with sales starting August 1, 2024. Additionally, lifetime license holders should expect to receive their 2024-25 licenses and tags on plain paper by September 1, 2024. The change to plain paper does not apply to the spring 2024 turkey season.

Highway Superintendent

The winter of 2023-2024 has been one of the mildest in memory. Despite the low snow totals the highway crew stays busy including hauling materials, building repairs and equipment maintenance. Less snow means savings on salt, fuel, overtime and vehicle wear and tear. Hopefully with these savings we will have more money to use for road repairs this summer.

On March 5 and 6 I traveled to Albany with hundreds of other highway superintendents from all over the state to attend our 2024 Local Roads Are Essential Advocacy Day. We visited the offices of Senator Pam Helming and Assemblywoman Marjorie Byrnes and shared our concern that maintenance of local roads and bridges should be a top priority in the State budget. All highway departments receive aid from NYS to help build and repair roads and bridges and that program is called CHIPS. (Editor's note: CHIPS stands for "CONSOLIDATED Local Street and HIGHWAY IMPROVENT PROGRAM") According to the Federal Highway Administration construction costs have escalated 58.6 % over the last 30 months. Without an increase in our local funding local governments will be forced to delay or defer critical projects. Hopefully the budget will include that increase!

The month of April will see snow fence coming down, roads being swept and winter plow damage being repaired along the roadsides. We'll also be inspecting the roads to see where best to invest our road repair monies. In May We'll be doing our first round of oil and stone which will be on Lefevre Road South and Sand Road. During the summer we'll be paving Strong Road as well as Baker Road from Elton to Cox Road. Next year we will finish Baker Road from Cox Road to Co. Rd. 35.






Some upcoming dates to remember:

April 20th: **Earth Day/Arbor Day Celebration.** Vendors and workshops focusing on sustainability, climate change, energy efficiency, etc.


June 16th: Father's Day Chicken BBQ

We had good turnouts for both the January & February Pancake Breakfasts, and our Troop would like to thank all the patrons who have helped our fundraising efforts.

Last year Troop 410 from Honeoye Falls, (an all-girl troop) joined us, as well as Mendon's Troop 105 (which is the troop I was in as a Scout).

HOW DID A LITTLE TOWN LIKE WEST BLOOMFIELD END UP WITH TWO FIRE COMPANIES?"

Today the 100% volunteer West Bloomfield and Ionia departments work as cooperative partners. They answer all calls together, share manpower and equipment, and often conduct joint training. North Bloomfield is protected under a contract with Honeoye Falls.

The West Bloomfield and Ionia departments did operate separately in the days when water supplies in some areas were very limited, and communication was difficult. There were no County fire dispatchers, and a call between Ionia and West Bloomfield was not only long distance, but also put through more than one phone company! Here is a summary of how the departments evolved:

The Town's first "fire department" was on Rt. 65 in the late 1800s, comprised of any available manpower and an iron bell with pull cord. A horse-drawn hand pumper was added in 1884 and in 1886 a North Bloomfield department was incorporated (later disbanded).


The West Bloomfield department was incorporated in 1951 after town citizens saw a need to better protect residents' lives and property and secure more favorable insurance rates for property owners.

Ionia's fire company was created in 1953, after a fire left a family homeless due to lack of water. Residents met on the church steps, formed a "protective organization," and raised funds for two large farm wagons with water tanks mounted on top, to be pulled by any available truck for a quick response.

Our volunteer fire companies respond to many kinds of calls. They not only fight fires but also assist ambulance crews, come to your home when the CO detector goes off, direct traffic at accidents, and are there when trees and wires are down, or flooding occurs. They provide "mutual aid" to the departments in our neighboring towns. And, like their founders, they continue to work at fund raising events. Both departments are grateful for the donations to their Annual Fund drives that help make this work possible.

As dedicated volunteers retire (some in their 80s), there is a real need to replace them. Volunteers can serve as fire fighters or fill other needs in the department. The need for younger volunteers and/or folks who are available during the day is critical. To learn more, stop at either station (Ionia on Co. Rd. 14 or West Bloomfield on Co. Rd. 37) on a Monday evening and speak to any member.



WEST BLOOMFIELD FIRE DEPARTMENT

West Bloomfield Fire Department was incorporated in 1951 and accomplished much in the years that followed: adding volunteers and training, purchasing equipment, establishing a private line phone hook-up, forming a Ladies Auxiliary, moving from a Town Hall shed to build its own firehouse, and raising funds for most of these activities. With the formation of Ionia Fire Company, a "First Alarm agreement" determined boundaries for the two departments. Today, with the shortage of new volunteers to join either group, the agreement has been set aside and both groups get alarmed for all calls in the Town of West Bloomfield.

A few notes from the History of the West Bloomfield Volunteer Fire Department by the late Afton Kilmer (covering 1952 – 1976):

"...1952 saw the department embark on the first of many clambakes the bean crop, too, proved a financial success A marching unit was formed in either '52 or '53 Our first carnival was held during the summer of 1953, on ground along Routes 5 and 20, upon which is now situated the Bloomdale Mobile Home Park."

"In 1957 the department and community lost "a great man and a great chief, our beloved Ellis Shetler.... During the later '50s, the need for a larger and more adequately equipped fire house became apparent It was agreed that this site should be farther east and on higher ground than the then carnival grounds so that ... the heavily loaded equipment would not have to start its journeys with an up-hill climb." A lot on "Dark Hollow Road" was purchased in 1957 with plans for a new firehouse to include kitchen, running water, rest rooms, and meeting facilities for members. "The main work was done by Sleight Brothers ... but much of the work, including the painting, plumbing, and electrical work was done by the members...." In 1958 another parcel of land bordering the lot was added. Obtaining a clear title was difficult, but Attorney Basil Moore provided all his services at no charge.

"In 1966 a "new tanker of 1400 gallons capacity was built for us (2001 Note: This truck is still in active service) A 'Base Station" radio was purchased in 1967. Monitors were "purchased and installed in most of the 'key' firemen's homes."

By 1968 "the department had grown, now had four pieces of equipment [and] more space was sorely needed During 1968 payment for the tanker was completed in full. Plans for an addition to the building, and for a new pumper were discussed at length." In 1971 the Town Board agreed to have a water line run into the fire house and in 1973 the new Sanford pumper arrived.

"Activities during 1974 were very progressive the Marching Unit was in fine shape, won a number of trophies, and again paraded, with fine results, at Fort Erie, as did our splendid Auxiliary, which is a credit to the department. Both the carnival and fund drive were huge successes, as were attendance at fire drills and schools." By 1975 the department was sponsoring a Boy Scout Troop, members poured a new concrete apron at the firehouse, and the department hosted meetings of the County Firemen and County Fire Police.

At the end of this "history to 1976" author Kilmer wrote "...I feel that our outfit was never in better shape; never in better hands; never composed of better or more efficient and enthusiastic members...."

Today, recruiting fire service volunteers is not a local problem, but a state and worldwide problem. The biggest concern is with small organizations losing their volunteer status and becoming paid professional groups, which would cause residents' fire tax to climb drastically. "According to an economic impact study released Monday [3/20/2023] by the Firefighters Association of the State of New York (FASNY) these dedicated volunteers help New York taxpayers save \$4.7 billion annually through their services." – John MacKenzie

Ionia Volunteer Fire Company Inc. Jeffrey Har

The Ionia Volunteer Fire Company, Inc., originated from community support, spirit, pride and *volunteerism*. The fire company is the result of a group of local residents meeting on the steps of the Ionia Methodist Church to discuss a better and more efficient way to fight fires, hours after a fire across the road from the church.

On July 12, 1953, a shed fire occurred at Timothy O'Brien's house across from the Methodist Church in Ionia. The fire originated within a shed attached to the house. The church bell summoned volunteer community people to a fire. The community people, with no training, relied on experience of other local fires and logic. This group of volunteers ran hose from the large cistern at the "Old Miller Barn" to the fire site. The shed fire was brought under control however, fire spread to the house. The water supply was exhausted, and the house was significantly damaged. Four fire departments also responded to assist in extinguishing the fire. Community people took in the family's children until permanent residence was obtained for the entire family.

That evening, a group of men met on the steps of the Methodist Church to discuss a better water supply and more efficient ways to fight fires. That evening they agreed to meet on July 21, 1953. At this meeting of local men, it was decided to form the "Ionia Fire Protection Organization." The Officers for the new organization were: Fredrick Howes Jr., President; William Washburn Sr., Vice President; and Harry Millspaugh, Secretary / Treasurer. Original Charter Members were: Raymond Appleton, Danny Broadwell, Keith Bennett, Ronald Bennett, Walter Bennett, Warren J. Butler, Alfred Catalano, Chris Catalano, Howard Chapple, John Cochran, Howard Conklin, Carl Davis, Gordon Flieger, Fred E. Howes, Fred J. Howes, George Howes, Luther Kuehl, Harry Millspaugh, Donald F. O'Brien, Donald Parrish, Jack Rayburn, and William Washburn.

On September 7, 1953, a meeting was held to discuss incorporation details. On November 18, 1954, the incorporation documents were signed by Supreme Court Justice Arthur E. Blauvelt and new name is "Ionia Volunteer Company, Inc."

A pledge to the community was held and raised over \$900 in donations and pledges for the new fire company. Land was deeded by Fred Howes, Sr., to build a new 30' by 50' fire house for \$1. The construction of the new fire station began in 1954 at an estimated cost of \$1,400. Construction of the new station was completed by volunteers in November of that year.

The community has always supported the fire department in many fundraising events over the years. The events included: dances, cookie sales, card parties, ham raffles, suppers/dinners, chicken barbeques, Mother's Day Ham Dinners, and annual fireman's carnivals. On August 4, 1954, the fire company members agreed to hold the first carnival on August 27th and August 28th. The carnivals were very successful in raising funds throughout the years. The annual firemen's carnival ended in 1985 due to the ever-increasing government requirements and the volunteer manpower required to successfully run a carnival.

The funds raised by the various events over the years afforded the expansions of the fire station to include: a larger kitchen at the rear of the station (1956), meeting room above the kitchen (1958) and expansion of the truck bays (1978). All of the manpower needed for each of these construction projects, involved volunteer fireman and community people.

Since 1953, the Ionia Fire Company has relied on continued community support for delivering fire protection to the residents in the Hamlet of Ionia and neighboring communities. Fast forward to today, the fire company still relies on community support. The funds needed to maintain the fire company comes from the municipal contract with the Town of West Bloomfield and funds donated to the department. Today's fire service looks and operates very differently than it did when it started in 1953. They have become the first response agency for most local emergencies. In addition to fires, the fire company runs to motor vehicle accidents, medical emergencies, field / grass fires, carbon monoxide calls, and public service calls such as trees or wires down and flooding.

The fire company has a dedicated group of members who give selflessly, to respond to emergency calls and maintains readiness of the members, fleet of vehicles and equipment. All of this is made possible by a dwindling and very precious resource, the "community people" to volunteer at the fire company. The fire company desperately needs new volunteers due to the number of aging members.



The department needs volunteers of all ages who would consider donating their time to the department and become part of the "brotherhood" of being a volunteer firefighter in the community. You don't need any special skill set or knowledge base to be a volunteer firefighter. Even if you are not interested in fighting fires, we need anyone that is willing to contribute time to the company. Stop at the station on Monday evenings and speak to any member at the station to learn more about the fire department.

Total Solar Eclipse

Monday April 8, 2024

Tips from Mark Minarich, Astronomy Section of the Rochester Academy of Science:

The Partial Phase of the eclipse for West Bloomfield **begins at 2:06 PM** with Totality beginning at 3:20 PM and lasting for 3 minutes 15 seconds. Then the partial phase resumes after totality ending at 4:33 PM.

The only safe way to look directly at the uneclipsed or partially eclipsed sun is through special-purpose solar filters, such as "eclipse glasses" (like those for sale at Rochester Museum and Science Center \$2.50 each) or from ASRAS folks (\$2 each).

You can also project an image of the partially eclipsed sun using anything with small holes like a colander or slotted spoon or poke a hole in a piece of cardboard.

During Totality (AND ONLY DURING TOTALITY) it is safe to look directly at the sun as its bright surface will be completely covered by the moon allowing you to see the silvery tendrils of the sun's corona streaming out from behind the black disk of the moon.


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
